Interview with Hildegarde Medina Emam, founder of VOX Infantis

Last December IWCN members enjoyed the Choir's Christmas Carol Concert in Gingins. The Charity Committee selected the non-profit association VOX Infantis to receive donations collected from the event. The Charity Committee invited Madame Hildegarde Medina Emam, the founder of VOX Infantis, who lives in Lausanne to attend the concert. We had the opportunity to talk with her about her organisation and ask a few questions. In 2010 VOX Infantis built a day-school in Kunduz, Afghanistan, which supports 70 children with education, shelter and food.

Charity Committee: Mme Emam, when you retired from working you created VOX Infantis. Why did you choose to get involved in charity work?

Mme Emam: I had a step-sister working with abandoned babies in Tunisia and I first began working with her. In 2003 VOX Infantis was created and seven years later we built the school.

CC: What motivates you to work so hard to help support the children and adults studying and working at the school in Kunduz?

Mme Emam: My husband was Afghan and we all were touched by the situation in that country at war for over 30 years. There was so much need. I met Shaista, an Afghan woman, living in Germany and working in Afghanistan. She became our delegate and we began our quest to help the children to a life of education that would offer them a future and hope.

CC: How do you finance the school?

Mme Emam: Our non-profit organisation has 100 members and regular sponsors for our ongoing activities. Some members are very active and are responsible for our stalls in the Lausanne market. Six times a year we sell homemade jams and biscuits to benefit the school. Recently, we requested some help from outside sources. I thank you for inviting me to your concert and I would like to thank all the donors. The funds received will supply food for the children. We are very grateful.

CC: We are glad you could share the day with us and enjoy some of the traditional music of our holiday season. We are glad to help VOX Infantis and thank the IWCN Choir and Choir Director, Linda Revkin, plus all those who attended and made a contribution to further the work you are doing in Afghanistan.

Mme Emam: It gives great pleasure to me and my Vox Infantis helpers to raise funds for our children in Afghanistan. Thank you for your donation.

From the President

Dear Members

February – the Christmas and New Year holidays are long gone and we are already into the second month of the year. I hope you all had a happy time with families and friends over the festive season, and now that we have turned the corner into 2015 we can look forward to spring.

In our game of connecting the Club's acronym to the area in which we live, we continue to discuss the letter "N". And I can see that there will be yet another "N" at the end of the word "Nyon". So – here we go.

National Cantons – have you ever wondered why this small country is divided into 26 cantons? Actually, six of these cantons are only half-cantons and each canton – including the half-cantons - has the same legal right and the same powers in daily life – except when it comes to representation in the Swiss parliament or the voting rights in a referendum. Way back in the past, each canton had its own army and money. From 1353 to 1481 there were eight cantons and they increased to

thirteen during the period of 1513 to 1798. From the formation of the modern confederacy in 1815, there were 25 cantons, which became 26 after the secession of the canton of Jura from Bern in 1979. The cantons are very independent, and despite going in the same direction, they conduct their business in their own individual way. In fact, there is a name for their system, Kantönligeist, which translates as each canton having its own identity, culture and history – and they guard it jealously. Each canton has its own flag, which can be seen at the cantonal administrative building – in the communes the communal flag and the cantonal flag are usually on display.

Natural history is right on our doorstep with the beautiful Jura mountains stretching from Geneva to the Rhine. These mountains account for about 12% of Switzerland's surface area and the rocks were formed between 208 million and 144 million years ago. This is the Jurassic period and, although these rocks are found elsewhere, they were first studied in the Swiss Jura in the 18th century. Fossils and dinosaur tracks abound and several tracks of the brachiosaur and carnivore dinosaur have been verified along the route of the forestry road La Heutte, situated between Biel and Sonceboz-Sombeval.

Going round the lake towards Martigny, you pass a small town called Bex. Legend has it that a shepherd noticed that his animals preferred drinking water from two particular springs, and when he tasted it himself, he realized that the water was salty. Between the 15th and 17th centuries, the natural salt mines were developed and they have been worked ever since. A labyrinth network of galleries burrows for 50 kilometres beneath the mountains, and the salt is still mined to this day. A trip to the salt mines for a guided tour on an underground narrow-gauge railway is a perfect way to entertain your visitors on a dismal day as the temperature inside the mines remains at a constant 17° C.



Still on natural wonders, let's go further into the Valais to Riederalp and Bettmeralp and view the mighty Aletsch glacier. This glacier is the largest in all the Alps and is one of the UNESCO World Heritage Sites. It is 23 kilometres long, 1,800 metres wide and has a surface area of 100 square kilometres. The massive ice flow starts at the north face of the Eiger, Mönch and Jungfrau and flows down into the Valais. The melted waters run into the Rhône, which in turn, flows through Lac Léman. Another fantastic trip for your summer visitors to take is the cable car up to 2,647 metres to the glacier from Riederalp or Bettmeralp and view this incredible swathe of ice.

An interesting excursion, while up at Riederalp, is to take a moment to visit the Villa Cassel built in 1899 by Sir Ernest Cassel, a wealthy banker. The wood and stone for the house, was obtained locally, and it all had to be carried 2,000 metres up the mountain on the backs of the local farmers and labourers. At that time, the going rate for the farmers was 2 francs per bag of cement and each journey took between three and four hours. The real test was transporting Cassel's piano up to the villa - four detachments of four men each struggled for two whole days to achieve this task. Famous and influential guests visited Cassel at the 25 -room villa, including Sir Winston Churchill, who wrote many of his books there, including the biography of his father, Lord Randolph Churchill. When Cassel died, his eldest granddaughter, Edwina Mountbatten, wife of Lord Louis Mountbatten, inherited the villa and the bulk of his vast fortune.

On our way back down to the lake, we can stop off to visit one of Switzerland's well-known natural resources, the concrete gravity dam, Grande Dixence, at the head of the Val d'Hérens. Built in the 1980s, this is Switzerland's largest reservoir and the highest in the world. It is 285 metres high, 700 metres long and 200 metres wide at the base. The structure contains approximately 6,000,000 cubic metres of concrete and at peak capacity holds 400,000,000 cubic metres of water, generating around 2,000 GWh annually, enough electricity to power 400,000 households. It's quite an experience to walk along the top of the dam and ponder on the immensity and complexity of the project.



Our journey back to Nyon takes us past the Château de Chillon. The first written records of this château date from 1005 AD. From the mid 12th century, the castle was home to the Counts of Savoy. Lord Alfred Byron, who wrote the poem "The Prisoner of Chillon" in 1816 made

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the château popular as a tourist attraction. The poem is about a monk and politician from Geneva, François de Bonivard, who was imprisoned there from 1530 to 1536. Byron also carved his name on one of the pillars in the gloomy and dank dungeons, and Henry James used the setting for his novella "Daisy Miller" (1878).

We haven't actually travelled very far in kilometres on this journey, but what wonderful things we have seen and what an amazing history Switzerland has. How was it so ignored in the first half of the 20th century? If you really want to know – visit the permanent exhibition of the history of Switzerland in the Château du Prangins – you will emerge with a very different view of the sturdy people of this beautiful country.

Thermal Bathers' Group

Wednesday 11 February



Thermes Parc Val d'Illiez (Chemin de la Vièze 7, 1873 Val d'Illiez) nestles in a pretty mountain valley near Champéry. The Centre was opened in 2010 and has spacious, modern facilities and attractive buildings with a lot of glass, wood and stone. The baths are fed by three springs that gush naturally at a temperature between 20°C and 32°C, from a depth of 1,200 metres. The water has a very high sulphur, calcium and magnesium content. The beneficial effects of this water have been widely recognized – though we will be bathing primarily for enjoyment!

The thermal bath complex consists of several indoor and outdoor pools, a natural thermal river and a sauna-Turkish bath area. For further

We will meet as usual at the Signy Shopping Centre Car Park Level 3 near the exit at 9h00. Car-pooling will be organised and the price per passenger is CHF15. The journey takes about an hour. Entry to the Thermal Centre is CHF22 (AVS 19.50). Afterwards, we have lunch at La Bergerie restaurant next door. 




